A Reading from the Book of Acts Acts 1:6-14

⁶ So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷ He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹ When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰ While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹ They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." ¹² Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. ¹³ When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. ¹⁴ All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

'Why stare at heaven's distant blue when Christ has told you what to do? Your gaze won't draw the clouds back down that rose with glory from the ground. Your Lord now reigns in realms above. Await God's wind and show God's love.'

The Gospel John 17:1-11

17 After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, "Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, ² since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. ³ And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. ⁴ I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. ⁵ So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed.

⁶ "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. ⁷ Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; ⁸ for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. ⁹ I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the

world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. ¹⁰ All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. ¹¹ And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one.

Message

At this moment of time we, in Australia, and indeed the rest of the world, could be said to be waiting:

Waiting for restrictions to be lifted

Waiting for life to get back to normal – whatever normal might be

Waiting to go on holidays again

Waiting for family and friends to come and visit in the way they always have

Waiting to resume work in our usual work places – that is if we have work to go back to Waiting to see if we can indeed get a job

Waiting for a vaccine that will enable us to get on with life in the way we've always known. For some, it is a time of waiting for death as infrastructure in many countries is unable to cope with the catastrophe that is the coronavirus

For still others, it is a time of waiting for leadership that has been found wanting, to be ousted and you could add your own list of what you have been waiting for.

But perhaps for others of us, this time has not been all that different to what has been happening for us over the past few years.

In our reading from Acts, the disciples could be said to have been in a time of waiting. Let's just recap a few of the things that we read in Luke's account of what is known as Jesus' ascension.

Firstly, Jesus tells the disciples that they will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon them and that they will witness to him - not only in Jerusalem but beyond its boundaries to the ends of the earth.

Secondly, we have an account of Jesus ascending in a cloud and disappearing from the disciples' sight – an angel tells them that he has been taken up into heaven. It's a bit of a stretch of the imagination, but I think we have to realise that what Luke is doing here is telling the story symbolically, just as he did in the story of Jesus' baptism where a dove – representing the Spirit, appeared, and when – as we will hear next week, he has the Spirit appearing as wind and fire at Pentecost. This symbolism is a wonderful way to tell a story which has, at its core, life and hope.

Thirdly, the disciples go back to Jerusalem where, we are told, they constantly devoted themselves to prayer, along with certain women.

They were waiting.

They were waiting in an in between time – not quite knowing what to expect but hoping that Jesus' promise would eventuate. When we celebrate Pentecost next week we are reminded once again that his promise was indeed fulfilled.

I think it's important to note how they spent their waiting time.

Of course we're not told the whole story as Luke gives only the bare bones. But for him it was important to let his readers know that they constantly devoted themselves to prayer. Obviously for the disciples it was important for them to maintain contact with the God whom they saw exemplified in Jesus.

At the end of this waiting time their lives were transformed by the gift of God's Spirit. As we wait out the effects and ravages of the Coronavirus we might ask ourselves, 'How are we using this in between time?' I've read of and heard about people using the time to hone up on skills that they haven't used for some time. Indeed I am one of this group as I've set myself the goal of practising the piano on a regular basis – something that I haven't done for quite some time. Others are learning new skills, still others are taking the time to read more, and I read of one person who has used this time to re-establish relationships that he had let slide in his pre-coronavirus days. There are still others – of all faiths, who are taking the time to draw closer to God through longer and more regular times of meditation, prayer and study of their scriptures. As disciples of Jesus, and particularly as a community of faith, we have an opportunity – untrammelled by the busyness of life, to think about what might be awaiting us when we emerge from this in between time – this time of waiting.

Do we go back to old ways of being?

What might be the challenges that will confront us?

Will we need to relate to people in a different way?

What might be the promise that Jesus gives us as we walk into a different future?

In our gospel readings over the last few weeks, we've been looking at a long speech from Jesus in the gospel of John, a speech usually known as the "farewell discourse". Here the author has Jesus talking to his disciples about how to prepare for his departure: for life when he was no longer physically with them.

Much of what Jesus says in this discourse is about relationship: about the relationship between him and his father, between him and his disciples and between his disciples and God, and our reading for today carries on this theme. For me, the last verse crystallises the importance of this relationship. Here, Jesus is praying that those first disciples – and indeed us his disciples in this day and age, may be one – just as he and God are one.

This passage has often been used to stress the importance of unity. We might ask ourselves what unity means. Is it about a group of people thinking the same thoughts? Is it about a group of people always agreeing? Is it about a group of people never having a disagreement? I don't think so! For me, unity is all about relationship.

I was talking with a colleague about this the other day and he mentioned that a good example of unity can be seen in our National Cabinet which includes premiers, chief ministers and the Prime Ministers, along with health officials. In this cabinet there are people who have different ideologies, different perspectives on life, different political stances, different personalities, and yet who have worked – over the last couple of months, at building relationships in order to get our country through a difficult time. We know it hasn't been perfect but I think it has been a great effort on their part.

When we come out the other end of this waiting time my hope that the things they have learnt through building relationships and trust and working for the common good will carry on into other aspects of our national life.

What might this have to say to us – Jesus' disciples, who continue to live through this waiting time?

Well maybe we can continue to build our relationship with God.

Maybe we can take the time to think about how we interact with people who might hold a different viewpoint to us and ask ourselves, 'Where might God be in this?'

Maybe we can learn new and creative ways of injecting life into relationships that have become mundane and life-sapping.

Maybe we can think about restoring relationships that have been fractured in some way and as we do this, seek God's help.

Jesus said, 'This is eternal life: to know the only true God, and to know Christ, whom God sent.'

These words are what our life as Jesus' disciples is all about. It is for this relationship, for this dance of love between God, Jesus, the Spirit and us, that we exist.

Certainly, as Christ's disciples, we are called to reach out to the world with God's love and mercy, but that mission finds its source and its energy from within the dance of love - the life of God.

Relationships take time to be built, to be nurtured and to grow. If our relationships with God and each other are to deepen, then we need to spend time in attending to them.

If love is to flourish and grow, we need the gift of "in-between" times, the pauses between chapters of activity.

Let's accept, as a gift, this 'in between time' that the Coronavirus has forced upon us. A gift that gives us time to strengthen our relationships.

Let's seize this opportunity to be more fully drawn into the eternal dance of love that is the inner life of God.

Like the murmur of the dove's song, like the challenge of her flight, like the vigour of the wind's rush, like the new flame's eager might: come, Holy Spirit, come.
