WELCOME - INTRODUCTION

Greetings from Tamworth City Uniting Church. Wherever you are, may this time be, for you a "holy" time when you feel the presence of God near to you, and when you feel the fellowship of others, even though they are not physically near.

According to the Church calendar, this Sunday is Pentecost 13, about half way through "Ordinary Time", the period between Pentecost and Advent. I see the three Bible readings all speaking of God's call to us in our ordinary, daily lives. At this time, may you, like Moses, hear God's voice promising, "I will be with you."

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

BIBLE READINGS

OLD TESTAMENT Exodus 3:1-15

Moses at the Burning Bush

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

The Divine Name Revealed

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I am who I am." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I am has sent me to you.'" God also said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The Lord, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you':

This is my name forever, and this my title for all generations.

EPISTLE Romans 12: 9-21

Marks of the True Christian

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers.

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

SERMON - THE BURNING BUSH

The image of the burning bush would be familiar to many. It has been the symbol of the Presbyterian Church ever since the 17th century. You may have noticed it engraved on the front of the Communion Table in our City Church (It came from the Tamworth Presbyterian Church in Marius Street at the time of Union). The words that accompany the symbol "nec tamen consumebatur" mean "and yet it was not consumed". Actually, different meanings have been ascribed to the symbol. In Reformation times, it referred to the church's being persecuted but still continuing. In later times, it has come to mean the continuing flame of God's energy and presence, His revelation of Himself, His call to service.

We recognize the image from the incident described in our Lectionary reading, Exodus chapter 3, 1-15, an event in the life of Moses, that giant figure of the Old Testament, revered for leading the enslaved Israelites out of Egypt through the desert to the Promised Land. Earlier, Moses had to flee from Egypt. He had settled in the land of Midian, where he married the daughter of Jethro and he lived there for some time, tending to his father-in-law's sheep. It was while out "beyond the wilderness" that Moses suddenly saw a bush ablaze with fire and yet not being consumed. His attention was caught: "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up."

From the bush, Moses heard God's voice telling him he was on "holy" ground. We most likely think of "holy ground" as being within a church building. But, you know, we stand on "holy ground" whenever we are in the presence of God, which can be anywhere, at any time. Moses had not been searching for God at that moment when suddenly his ordinary life was transformed by the presence of the divine. In your life as a Christian, there will come times when you will suddenly feel the presence of God very close to you. Such times are not reserved for a few special "saints" or even for special "sacred" occasions. We need to live with the expectation of God's presence near, and we should be prepared to learn from that experience. Perhaps this time of Corona Virus, when we have been unable to worship in a church, may heighten this awareness for you and increase your readiness to turn to Him in your "isolation", in your own home!

Moses was told by God to take off his shoes because he was on "holy ground". Removing footwear before entering a church is the custom in some religions.

What is being said symbolically is that our lives can become so cluttered with worldly issues that we lose sensitivity to relationships and events that could have in them the voice of God speaking to us. The poet, Gerard Manley Hopkins (also a priest), in one of his poems, likens our loss of that sensitivity to our feet being separated from the earth because of our wearing shoes:

"Why do men then now not reck His rod?
Generations have trod, have trod, have trod;
And all is seared with trade; bleared, smeared with toil;
And wears man's smudge and shares man's smell: the soil Is bare now, nor can foot feel, being shod."

We all need to, figuratively, 'take off our footwear' (that is, clear away the press of worldly things) so that we can hear God's voice speaking to us in a multitude of ways – maybe not as clearly enunciated as to Moses at the burning bush – but there all the same, perhaps in a rainbow, a piece of music, sunrise, a person's smile, a friend's greeting, all manner of happy moments (or, indeed, sad ones too!).

After Moses answered God's voice, saying "Here I am.", God told him what He required of him: "I have observed the misery of my people; I know their sufferings. I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." These words showed that God was not a distant Being, but rather One who saw and heard the cries of the enslaved people and who was speaking of deliverance for them through Moses. Of course, God could have acted independently, but the Scriptures and history tell us that He often reaches out to the needy of this world through human beings. To Moses He said, "I will send you.' It is still how the Lord works today. As we hear God's voice, we will be pointed to serve Him in some way. You see, to know the special holiness of God's presence is not just meant to be a personal experience which we hug to ourselves. We are commanded to take off that which insulates us from being vulnerable, from taking risks, from stepping outside our comfort zone - anything that isolates us from other people, from God, from creation, even from our truest selves. Each generation of worshippers is directed by God to unbind the straps of apathy and fear, of self-importance and arrogance, and to set aside any worn-out concepts that would prevent hearing and responding to His words.

Well, Moses wasn't at all eager to take up God's command to return to Egypt, and he made several excuses for not doing so: "What if the people question my credentials or what if they do not believe me?" You know, it is possible for people (and for us) to question the existence of God in this present pandemic, and yet, even at this time, it can be our privilege to hear the voice of God speaking to us and directing us to witness in various ways that God is with us and we can know His presence and trust Him, as we are finally led out of this trying situation. Moses asked God for signs to give to the people to prove that God was speaking to them. We can see signs of God's Spirit alive and at work about us even at this time - for instance, in all the ways the Church has adapted to communicate the Gospel and to reach out to people - new ways for God's voice to be heard!.

Then Moses tried to excuse himself by saying that he had no special talents to be able to carry out God's commands: "O my Lord, please send someone else." We too may well want to leave the Church's work to the few appointed leaders and committees or to those who have computer and other technical skills, but there are ways of communicating with others which will allow us all to express the care and concern of God. Christians are finding varied ways of serving others - doing shopping for another, transporting someone, remembering others in prayer, donations of cooking, a telephone call or a letter or card, a thoughtful word or cheery greeting, caring for each other at home, attendance at a meeting (zoom or otherwise). These things need not be beyond us and they can be the means of answering God's call to show his concern and His love, and to witness that, while the times can engender fear, anxiety, helplessness, God has not deserted us and, indeed, He can be found in all that is happening.

The Lectionary reading of Romans 12: 9-21 reinforces the importance of such witness. We are pointed to practical acts in good relationship to others, and these may seem to be just a list of ethical instructions that should apply to all members of the community. But these recommended actions should be viewed in the light of what Paul says in the first two verses of chapter 12. Our primary aim is to offer our lives to God, what Paul calls our "spiritual worship", thereby allowing God's Spirit to "renew" our lives, so that our service of others arises from a love that is the result of God's love to us. It has been put this way: "God has done great things; therefore, we will love, be ardent in spirit, rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, contribute to the needs of others, and so on". God's call is not firstly to a task or an office, but to a joyful relationship with Him. As Moses was called, so are we, for God calls each of us. Paul says in 2nd Timothy 1:9: "God has saved us and called us with a holy calling, not in virtue of our works, but in virtue of His own purpose and the grace which he gave us in Christ Jesus".

One of the Lutheran Reformation's greatest contributions to the Christian church was its teaching about "vocation". In those days it was a word referring to monks, nuns, and priests, while ordinary Christians were left to feel that they did not have divine vocations or callings. Even today, the temptation is to take the <u>Time</u> magazine approach and see "<u>Religion</u>" as but one segment, which should be kept in its place, separate from the other aspects of our lives. But according to Luther, we are all priests for one another. Our Christian calling relates directly to who we are, what gifts we have been given, and our entire life's activities and experiences. Every Christian's calling or vocation ultimately stems from a recurring sense that life is not for nothing, that who and where we are, may be exactly as God needs and wants us to be. Paul Wilkes writes, "our labours, humble or vaunted, are potentially an unending source of holiness, purification, and grace."

When we feel fearful or inadequate, let's remember that the people used by God in the Scriptures were themselves far from perfect - Jacob, David, Moses Peter, Paul himself! But a person who puts his or her life to the service of God is given the faith to bring fear and anxiety under control, yes even in such times as we are experiencing now, because that person has found something stronger than fear, something that will subdue anxiety. When we find our purpose in God's purpose, then the Almighty stands behind us, He is with us, He is within us, His strength supplements our strength, His love expands our love, and the warmth of His grace nurtures our lives. Our God is a great God, and in His will and strength, we find (like Moses and the others) ourselves able to face difficult days and to overcome our fears and doubts. We will be enabled to venture out into the unknown land, to do all we can, on any given day, and having done all, to stand our ground.

What does God's call mean for us? This is the question at the heart of this week's Lectionary. Moses answered God's call to go back and save his people, in spite of his fears, uncertainties and struggles. In the Lectionary Gospel, Matthew 16: 24, Jesus spoke of His impending death and He called His disciples to take up their cross and follow Him in service. Both the Gospel reading and the Moses story are supported by Paul's words to the Romans, as he urges them to live in love, giving themselves for the well-being of others in practical ways. So, what God may be wanting us to hear this week is that we are all called to follow Christ, to be the liberators of others, serving and loving all people and, even in the midst of these trying times, to see a light of hope in God's promise that, in this self-giving love, we will find our 'souls' (our true, Godgiven selves) and we will discover real, abundant life in Him.

Moses "the excuse-maker" became Moses "the liberator", at God's call and with His support. Our "liberator" today is Jesus Christ who frees and supports us so that we may become exactly what God intends us to be. Another old motto for the burning bush symbol was "Ardens sed virens" -" burning but flourishing"! May you find that true for you!
