## **Climate Change Action**

Independent Member for the Australian Parliament – Zali Steggall, OAM MP is introducing a Private Members' Bill to the House of Representatives. Ms Steggall says: 'The impacts of Climate Change represent the greatest threat to our national security, our economy, our health and our environment. But if we implement an effective plan now, we can create a safe and prosperous future for ourselves and our children.'

The Climate Change Act she is proposing advocates a a national climate policy, ending all climate wars, and ensuring a safe and prosperous future for us all and especially our children.

## **Returning to Worship**

Things will look and feel different at church when you return (to comply with current restrictions and to keep you safe):

- Worship will commence at 9:30am, hand sanitizing station as you enter and leave, you will need to wear a mask while entering and leaving worship,
- Couples and families may sit together, everyone else will be seated 1.5m apart, (total 45 people)
- You will need to register with the office to attend each week,
- If you are unwell or have visited a Covid-Hotspot you will not be able to attend worship,
- You will be instructed on the process for departing by Rev Betty/Lay Leader immediately prior to leaving, particularly in regard to social distancing and waiting,
- There will be no singing., humming or dancing, an offering plate will be left at the entry table for envelopes and cash. Handing after the service with gloves.
- There will be no morning tea after worship (if you want to go somewhere else or have someone over to your place that is ok), you will be encouraged to leave the site as soon as possible after worship. Social distancing is the hardest thing to do!
- There will be one person on the door (making the role and counting 45), one sound desk operator, one preacher (lapel mic), one elder (lectern mic), one reader (pulpit mic), one organist.
- There will be markers outside the church to indicate 1.5m social distancing.


## **Food Pantry**

# Seasons of the Spirit

# A Prophetic Vision's Power

Deuteronomy 34:1-12; Psalm 90:1-6, 13-17; 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8; Matthew 22:34-46

Prayer

Creator of life, you set before us the promise of freedom and opportunity to live in a just and compassionate relationship with one another and all of life. Thank you for the prophetic voices who remain empowered by the vision of a land of promise for all, and who call upon us to join our voice with theirs. Amen.

Biblical Background

This week's scripture passages speak to the power of love; giving us vision, bringing joy in times of struggle, shaping us as a community, and grounding our faith in a practice that confronts injustice with a bold but straightforward proposition: love.

Deuteronomy 34:1–12 If ever there was a time for Moses to experience heartbreaking disappointment, the events in this week's reading is such a time. Moses has invested his entire adult life leading the people on a long 40-year journey through the wilderness. Again and again the people lost faith, breaking covenant with each other and God, believing the certainty of imperial oppression was better than the uncertainty of this wilderness journey. In spite of their betrayals, Moses remained an unfailing advocate for the people, never relinquishing the vision of freedom that God had given him and the people. The journey, however, was enough to exhaust and deplete the most dedicated and faithful of leaders.

Now, Moses finds himself on a mountaintop, looking out at the promised land, having been told by God that this is where his journey will end. There will be for Moses no celebratory crossing of the Jordan River. There will be no tasting the ripe, juicy grapes and the sweet honey about which they had dreamed as they wandered in the wilderness, munching on the same old manna, day after day. All Moses was offered is a vision of the promised land. Yet, according to the text, the vision seems to be more than enough. You can almost hear Moses say, as Martin Luther King Jr. would say years later, just before his assassination, "I have seen the promised land, I may not get there with you, but I want you to know, that we as a people, will get to the promised land."

Moses has every reason to feel exhausted, tired, discouraged and heartbroken, but we are told: "his sight was unimpaired, and his vigour had not abated." For Moses, the vision of the promised land was never

limited to the physical territory the people were about to enter. The promised land resided in the promise of freedom and justice for all people. This is something the Israelites, including the author of Deuteronomy, would forget; as the Deuteronomist goes on to recount a story of genocide and the same imperial, brutal practices toward the Canaanites as had been experienced by the Israelites in Egypt. Yet, in spite of the never-ending allure that systems of dominations can provide, neither the Israelites nor the Deuteronomist could forget the prophetic power of the vision by which Moses guided the people.

Psalm 90:1–6, 13–17 is a selection of verses from the only psalm attributed to Moses, or at the very least in remembrance of Moses. With unflinching honesty, the psalm speaks of disappointment and failure, but also the steady joy that comes from trusting the liberating vision given by God.

In 1 Thessalonians 2:1–8, Paul rejects imperial, hierarchical authority, which he says he could claim if he were inclined. Instead, Paul's gospel model is a gentle authority, like that of a mother nursing a chid.

Matthew 22:34–46 reflects the tension, conflict, and contradiction between an imperial theology of hierarchy and the realm of God. The Good News theology proclaimed by Jesus centred in love of God and love of neighbour.

#### **2uestions**

It is the vision of freedom and promise rather than life turning out precisely as Moses expects and desires that gives Moses hope. He could live with discouragement, frustration, and betrayal because the vision God had given them as a community was intended as a blessing for all people, and this vision never loses its force or power. It is this same vision that is the source of life and strength for the Psalmist, Paul, and Jesus as he confounds those whose lives are governed by imperial rules rather than the power of love.
