¹⁵ "If your brother or sister sins, go and point out their fault, just between the two of you. If they listen to you, you have won them over.

¹⁶ But if they will not listen, take one or two others along, so that 'every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses.'

¹⁷ If they still refuse to listen, tell it to the church; and if they refuse to listen even to the church, treat them as you would a pagan or a tax collector.

Matthew 18:15-20 and Musings:

This reading is one which can sit a bit uncomfortably. After all, we don't enjoy being at odds with other people. Quite often differences are "swept under the carpet", rather than being dealt with. It can feel easier to let the issue go, than to make a fuss. Sometimes choosing to ignore it can "leave a bad taste in our mouths", and the matter never really disappears.

Gossipping, or talking behind the other persons' back, are not behaviours which even came into consideration in what Jesus said. They were strictly "off limits".

To choose the way Jesus suggested, you need to be certain of your facts before beginning the process. Attempting to see the situation the other persons point of view can be helpful. Have they deliberately done the wrong thing? Is it just a misunderstanding?

When we feel that we have been let down by someone we trusted, we may have lots of feelings to deal with, as well as the wrong which has been done. We may need to manage those feelings before we are truly able to proceed with facing the other person. We may need to ask for Jesus' strength to help us to deal with hurt feelings.

This reading gives the correct protocols for resolving disagreements:-

- 1. Take the matter up with your brother.
- 2. If that doesn't work, take along a couple of church members along with you, and attempt to discuss the matter amongst the small group. Hopefully the person who has wronged you will listen to the impartial witnesses you bring with you.
- 3. The next phase of escalation is to attempt to bring the matter to the congregation as a whole..... never an easy process! If the disagreement cannot be resolved at this level, "treat him as you would a pagan or a tax collector".

This is where it gets very tricky. How did Jesus treat tax collectors?

He treated them as friends. He ate with them; he befriended them; he accepted them.

That isn't the way that the rest of the world treated tax collectors or pagans. Others looked down their noses at them, and shunned them.

I guess that Jesus was asking us whether we will treat others as he would treat them, or as others would treat them. Whose lead will we follow?

That brings up further tricky questions. If we accept those who have wronged us, do we have to trust them? Do we allow people to wrong us again, or do we take steps to limit our vulnerability?

There are no clear, black-and-white answers! Blessings from Meg

- We pray for friends in lockdown in aged care facilities.


Gathered in His Name
