## **Luke 6:31-40** (NLT)

## A Discussion about the Sabbath

6 One Sabbath day as Jesus was walking through some grainfields, his disciples broke off heads of grain, rubbed off the husks in their hands, and ate the grain.

<sup>2</sup> But some Pharisees said, "Why are you breaking the law by harvesting grain on the Sabbath?"

<sup>3</sup> Jesus replied, "Haven't you read in the Scriptures what David did when he and his companions were hungry?

He went into the house of God and broke the law by eating the sacred loaves of bread that only the priests can eat. He also gave some to his companions."

And Jesus added, "The Son of Man is Lord, even over the Sabbath."

## Jesus Heals on the Sabbath

<sup>6</sup>On another Sabbath day, a man with a deformed right hand was in the synagogue while Jesus was teaching.

<sup>7</sup> The teachers of religious law and the Pharisees watched Jesus closely. If he healed the man's hand, they planned to accuse him of working on the Sabbath.

<sup>8</sup> But Jesus knew their thoughts. He said to the man with the deformed hand, "Come and stand in front of everyone." So the man came forward.

<sup>9</sup> Then Jesus said to his critics, "I have a question for you. Does the law permit good deeds on the Sabbath, or is it a day for doing evil? Is this a day to save life or to destroy it?"

<sup>10</sup> He looked around at them one by one and then said to the man, "Hold out your hand." So the man held out his hand, and it was restored!

# Luke 6:31-40 (NLT) **Do Not Judge Others**

<sup>37</sup> "Do not judge others, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn others, or it will all come back against you. Forgive others, and you will be forgiven.

<sup>38</sup> Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back."

<sup>39</sup> Then Jesus gave the following illustration: "Can one blind person lead another? Won't they both fall into a ditch? <sup>40</sup> Students are not greater than their teacher. But the student who is fully trained will become like the teacher.




Paul Turner passed away on 22nd November.

40 "And the King will say, 'I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me!'

41 "Then the King will turn to those on the left."

<sup>41</sup> "Then the King will turn to those on the left and say, 'Away with you, you cursed ones, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his demons.

<sup>42</sup> For I was hungry, and you didn't feed me. I was thirsty, and you didn't give me a drink.


<sup>43</sup> I was a stranger, and you didn't invite me into your home. I was naked, and you didn't give me clothing. I was sick and in prison, and you didn't visit me.'

<sup>44</sup> "Then they will reply, 'Lord, when did we ever

see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and not help you?

<sup>45</sup> "And he will answer, 'I tell you the truth, when you refused to help the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were refusing to help me.'

<sup>46</sup> "And they will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous will go into eternal life."

#### From Rev Geoff Flynn

Last weekend I finally got around to sorting out my theological library. Inevitably, this is a slow process as I keep dipping into various books to remind myself of why I should keep it on my shelf. I came some words of encouragement in "Preaching and Teaching in the Small Church" by Willimon and Wilson.

"Small churches may not be able to fit some of our current images of Ecclesiastical success; they may not be able to meet whatever organisational requirements may be placed on them by their various denominations: they may fail in their attempts to provide even the vaguest semblance of the full program church. But to our knowledge there are no small churches that do not do a reasonably good job of celebrating Sunday. In fact, some small churches celebrate Sunday in a fashion that puts many of their larger sister churches to shame."

There is nothing wrong with a Church existing primarily for worship on a Sunday as Sunday is a biblical and theological statement of who Christians are, what Christian worship is about and what the church is called do. That is to glorify God and enjoy God forever.

"It is also true that even as we are busy serving God in worship, we find that our needs are being graciously served by God when we worship." Surely that is the best gift we can hope to receive this Christmas.

## Best Christmas Ever.

My family were on our way from Paris to Nice in a rented car. For five days everything had gone wrong. On Christmas Eve, there was no Christmas spirit in our hearts.

It was raining and cold when we went out to eat. In a drab little restaurant shoddily decorated for the holiday, a few tables were occupied. There were two German couples, two French families, and an American sailor who was writing a letter.

The waiter brought us the wrong thing.

At the table with the French family, the father slapped one of his children for some minor infraction and the boy began to cry.

On our right, the German wife was berating her husband.

We were interrupted by an unpleasant blast of cold air. Through the front door came an old flower woman. She wore a dripping, tattered overcoat, and shuffled in on wet, rundown shoes. She went from one table to the other.

"Flowers, Monsieur? Only one franc." No one bought any.

Wearily she sat down at a table between the sailor and us. "A bowl of soup please. I haven't sold a flower all afternoon." To the piano player she said hoarsely, "Can you imagine, Joseph, soup on Christmas Eve?"

He pointed to his empty "tipping plate."

The young sailor finished his meal and got up, put on his coat,

he walked over to the flower woman's table.

"Happy Christmas," he said, smiling and picking out two corsages.

"How much are they?"

"One franc, Monsieur."

Pressing one of the smallest flowers flat, he put it into the letter he had written, then handed the woman a 20-franc note.

"I don't have change, Monsieur," she said. "I'll get some from the waiter."

"No, Ma'am," said the sailor, leaning over and kissing the ancient cheek. "This is my Christmas present to you."

Then he came to our table, holding the other corsage in front of him. "Sir," he said to me, "may I present these flowers to your beautiful wife?" In one quick motion he gave my wife the corsage, wished us a Merry Christmas and departed. Everyone had stopped eating. Everyone had been watching the sailor.

A few seconds later Christmas exploded throughout the restaurant like a bomb.

The old flower woman jumped up, waving the 20-franc note, shouted to the piano player,

"Joseph, my Christmas present! And you shall have half so you can have a feast too."

The piano player began to belt out Good King Wenceslas.

My wife waved her corsage in time to the music. She appeared 20 years younger. She began to sing, and our three sons joined her, bellowing with enthusiasm.

"Gut! Gut!" shouted the Germans. They began singing in German.

The waiter embraced the flower woman. Waving their arms, they sang in French.

The Frenchman who had slapped the boy beat rhythm with his fork against a glass. The lad, now on his lap, sang in a youthful soprano.

A few hours earlier 18 persons had been spending a miserable evening. It ended up being the happiest, the very best Christmas Eve they had ever experienced.
