I am looking forward to my first Gospel Breakfast at Hallsville on Sunday Morning. At the same time, I have been reflecting on what makes a breakfast "Gospel." We're familiar with the Gospel According Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, which are each quite distinct. But what is the Gospel According to You from the vantage point of twenty-first knowledge? What is the Gospel According to Peel Valley? What good news do we have to share about who Jesus is, who God is, or what insights we are living into about how to live an abundant life according to the way of Jesus? These related questions seem appropriate as we reflect this week on the first 20 verses of the Gospel, the "good news" according to Mark.

In Mark chapter one, the phrase "good news" appears three times, and in each instance, there is a different nuance of meaning. In verse one, Mark tells us that his book concerns the "good news of Jesus Christ." In verse fourteen, Jesus comes proclaiming the "good news of God." And, in verse fifteen, Jesus instructs us to "believe in the good news." So, at least in the first chapter of Mark, the phrase "good news" has at least three different shades of meaning. When trying to understand the Gospel of Mark's firstcentury perspective from our twenty-first century context, we cannot remind ourselves often enough of the historical event surrounding Mark's writing. In the middle of the Roman-Jewish War. Mark uses the genre of gospel, a genre typically associated with good news from the battlefield regarding Roman military victories or a new Roman emperor — to tell the subversive good news of Jesus, a Jewish peasant whom the Roman had crucified decades earlier.

If we keep this in mind, we can take heart that proclaiming the Gospel was not any easier back them than it is now. However, despite the negative impression many people have of followers of Jesus we are the custodians of a message of good news which Jesus calls the "kingdom of God" that is, the way of being in the world when God is in charge instead of our politicians or global corporations. Do we believe this? What is holding us back from sharing this good news with everyone we meet?
