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Luke 1:39-45, (46-55) (NRSVU) Mary Visits Elizabeth

³⁹ In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, 40 where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. 41 When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. Words from Rev Geoff Let God Surprise you for Christmas

This year we have the opportunity to sing Christmas Carols in both English and Fijian on Saturday night at Tamworth Southside. Did you know that our beloved tradition of singing carols during Christmas is rooted in Luke's account of the birth of Jesus in the first two chapters of his gospel? Luke tells the story around three songs. There is Mary's "Magnificat" (Lk 1:46-55); Zechariah's "Benedictus" (Lk 1:68-79); and Simeon's "Nunc Dimittis" (Lk 2:29-32). The names of these songs are each taken from the opening words of each song in Latin.

The most famous of these songs is the Magnificat, which is still chanted during the full celebration of the Mass in the Roman Catholic tradition and regularly performed by professional choirs. It is certainly up there with some of the most revolutionary words that have been set to music in the world. And it is the focus for this Sunday's gospel reading.

The first part of Mary's song is personal: She has been recognized. (1:48). As a servant girl, she is as astonished as we are. It is still extraordinary that God works through the least, unnoticed by all those whose gaze is captured by the Caesars and Pilates, the Herod's and

high priests of the world.

The second part of the Magnificat is about God demonstrating extraordinary strength (1:51)—which is ironic and profound, given who God has chosen. This alternative power, ignored by the "proud," seems mysteriously lodged in oppressed women giving birth in the face of empire.

The promise of Micah 5 is that God will be faithful and will appear in surprising ways. As Advent draws to a close, Micah invites us to look for God's presence where we least expect and to be attuned to the songs of the small, the powerless, and the vulnerable. Are we prepared to be surprised? Are we prepared to welcome the Holy One into our midst the Christmas? With less than a week to go to Christmas I urge you not to let, last minute shopping, Christmas dinner arrangements and holiday plans prevent you for seeing what God is doing in your life and the lives of those around you.

May God's love uphold and sustain you this Christmas.

A Song Forged from Silence

How a Broken Organ Gave the World "Silent Night"

It was Christmas Eve, 1818, in the village of Oberndorf, in the Austrian Alps. A biting chill swept through the newly constructed church as Joseph Mohr, the village priest, paced anxiously. The church organ—a vital instrument for the midnight service—lay broken and silent, a cruel blow to the evening's carefully planned music. Mohr's heart sank. What could be done now? The silence of the instrument threatened to ruin the sacred celebration.

Mohr remembered a truth he often preached: God's plans rise in the face of human failure. "Problems are God's opportunities," he reminded himself. Inspired by that thought, of a poem he had written two years earlier: "Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright." A new idea took shape—a song that could be sung without the need for an organ.

Mohr went to see Franz Gruber, the church organist.

"We need a melody," he said, holding up the scribbled lines of his poem. "A simple one—." The two men worked tirelessly, Gruber pulling together chords and harmonies, the soft sounds of the guitar filling the silence left by the organ. By the time the bells tolled midnight, their creation was ready. That night, on December 24th, 1818, the congregation gathered in the dim candlelit church. As Mohr and Gruber stood at the front, Gruber's guitar gently accompanied their voices as they sang:

"Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright..."

It was simple, pure, and hauntingly beautiful. The music, born of brokenness, filled the small church with peace. ~TD Hale(Excerpt)


