Minister's Weekly Reflection

The song 'Something Beautiful, something good' from Bill and Gloria Gaither's collection of music comes to mind as I reflected on our Gospel reading this week. For me, this passage is a case of another beautiful play on events witnessed. We, of course, know the story of what is yet to come for Jesus – his death, but we are also present in the room with Lazurus – the one Jesus brought raised back to life. And as the story goes, it is Mary who is anointing Christ's feet, perhaps a prophetic moment in the act of preparing the Lamb of God for his death. 'Something beautiful, something good'.

Judas, of course, had other agendas when he challenged Mary's anointing of the feet of Jesus. Perhaps, we too sometimes query the creating of a beautiful worship space. Should we not be spending the money on the poor rather than putting in flowers, lighting candles, polishing lovely brass and so on. For those of us who cherish the church space, there is often something about tenderly caring for and enhancing what we experience as the life of Christ which we find present there. And that is the beauty of our experience as people of God. That we continually find ourselves in this beautiful struggle of where to exert our resources in we get it wrong. And as the song 'something beautiful, something good' progresses, a line goes '...all I had to offer him, was brokenness and strife, but he made something beautiful of my life.' Just as Mary had the jar of expensive oil yet offered it to Christ, although she was met with criticism, Christ affirms Mary's act of hospitality. It is often like honouring that life by making beauty for its reception, imagining greeting Christ with our best efforts at hospitality. Certainly, people who walk into such a church seem to recognize the bringing together of the divine and the human.

In Lent, we could imagine that we are touching, in care, the Christ who walks on to the cross.

Velcro:

In 1941, a Swiss mechanical engineer named George de Mestral was taking a walk in the Alps with his dog. He noticed that both his clothes and his dog's fur were covered with small burdock seeds. These seeds, known for their ability to easily stick to any surface, piqued his curiosity. On closer inspection he realized that the seeds had a fascinating structure: they were covered with tiny hooks that latched onto the loops of fabric and fur.

Intrigued by this natural mechanism, George decided to examine one of the seeds under a microscope . He discovered that the small hooks, called "cips," adhered effortlessly to the loops in the fibers of his clothes. This seemingly simple but highly effective phenomenon sparked an innovative idea. What if he could replicate this fastening mechanism in a synthetic material that would be practical and easy to use across different fields?

Motivated, George de Mestral experimented with synthetic materials and designing a system that mimicked the structure of the burdock seeds After years of trials and improvements, in 1955, he was able to patent it under the name "Velcro," a combination of the French words "velours" (velvet) and "crochet" (hook), which refers to the two main parts of the system: one strip with small hooks and another with small loops . When pressed together, the hooks latch onto the loops, creating a strong and firm connection that can easily be separated when desired.

De Mestral's invention, initially a curiosity of nature, became a technological revolution . Velcro found applications in a wide range of industries, from fashion and sportswear to aerospace and medicine . ease of use made it an essential tool in everyday life.

The material's durability and ability to be reused many times made it ideal for various products, such as shoes, sports equipment, medical devices, and astronaut clothing Over the years, Velcro has proven to be much more than just a fastener. Its impact has been so profound that it has become an everyday item in most homes and an indispensable solution in sectors as diverse as the military, industrial, and technological fields . The legacy of George de Mestral lies not only in his invention but also in his ability to see the potential in something as common as a burdock seed and transform it into an innovation that has changed the way we interact with the world. His story is a testament to the power of observation, curiosity, and perseverance to create practical solutions that improve people's lives. ~ História Al


