

The Trinity as a Circle

It can be quite puzzling for many Christians when we say that there is only one God and then start talking of three – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We say this is a mystery: three persons, but one God. Three sides, like the three leaves of the clover leaf; three 'states', like water, mist and ice, but one element. But even when we look at it like this it can still

be quite confusing. But, if we are not to lose the great gift of thinking of God in this way then we need to understand as much as we can.

Many understandings have been promulgated:

to think of the Trinity as an isosceles triangle with the Father on top, and Jesus and the Holy Spirit referred to by name but definitely not coequal. This is a hierarchical model and not a good way to understand the Trinity.

Then there is to look upon the Trinity as an equilateral triangle – with the Father, Son and Spirit at each point, and then only talk to one point – or one person in the Trinity. Typically, but not universally, 'traditional' Christians address God as Father, evangelicals talk to Jesus, and charismatics speak to the Holy Spirit. By doing this we miss out on the liberation of the Trinity, and so fail to live out the difference it makes to our relationship with God and each other.

BUT ... if we see the Trinity as a circle – no beginning or ending, no top or bottom, God and existing and eternal relationship – Jesus saying, 'I am in the Father and the Father is in me' makes sense. This is the relationship we are invited to join, so that we pray IN God Jesus Holy Spinit



God and not TO God. Here we see God committed to the dance of an equal and unending relationship, willing to suffer rather than force us into relationship. We see the Father and the Holy Spirit in agony with Jesus on the cross, so close is the relationship – in Greek icons you always see some representation of each person of the Trinity on the cross.

We are invited to be in this relationship, part of the dance, knowing the vulnerability and the joy of love. Instead of constantly searching for the way to God, whenever we pray we dwell IN God, in the Loving God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – our Creator, Redeemer, Sustainer.
